

Choosing A Pet Bed Size

Body Length. When your pet is lying down, measure body length. Then add 8 inches. The total is the width your pet will need for an oval bed, and the depth your pet will need for a rectangular bed. Dimensions of each bed can be found on the [product ordering page](#).

Weight. Make sure you have your pet's current weight. That, combined with your pet's body length, will help you choose the right size bed on the chart below.

Bed Type. What type of bed are you buying? If the bed has a bolster or other raised exterior, you'll need to consider the interior dimensions, not the external ones.

Go Large. If you're stuck between two sizes, go for the larger one. Your pet would prefer to lounge comfortably. We've checked.

The chart below can help, too, but always measure your pet's body length before purchasing!

If your pet is...

Then we suggest...

Up to 12 lbs.
A small cat or one of the toy dog breeds.

XS - The X-small rectangular bed will fit nicely.



Up to 20 lbs.
An average cat or small dog.

S - The small rectangular or small oval beds, or the small heated pet cushion should be comfy.



Up to 30 lbs.
A (really) large cat, or a medium dog breed.

M - The medium oval Therabed or DuoTemp beds, or the medium heated cushion, will do the trick.



Up to 50 lbs.
Medium-large dog breeds.

L - The large oval Therabeds or large heated cushion will give your pet room to stretch.



Up to 80 lbs.
Extra large breeds.

XL - The X-Large Memory Foam Therabed or DuoTemp beds give larger dogs a comfortable spot.
